Ve must keep in mind that Satan's most potent weapon is DECEIT.
4. TO WITHSTAND. The high places of verse 12 are the same as in 1:3.
It is where Christ is, ( $1: 2 a$ ). It is where the Church is, $(2: 6)$. It is the place from which the church -witnesses to principalities and 'powers, (3:10). So our conflict or 'wrestling is from this high place and is against the powers of the air, against rulers of the darkness iof this world. Since it is not lof God to withstand.
5. TO STAND. Faving done all, we are yet to stand. This refers to the working out of salvation. Rom. 18:37-39 has some hint of this as well as phil. 2:12 where we are to work out our salvation with fear and trembling. It gives us to understand that as long as there is Iife: there will be warfare. Satan does not stop his attacks. The days in whioh we live axe evil and this evil will steadily increase.

## -THE 10 COMTANDPENTS- - "BODY" IN THE NT-

When these were first given, they were not law, but the conditions of a covenant. The covenant was with Israel, whom God had ordained to be a PEGULIAR TREASURE land a PRIESTIY INTION. But Israel broke their covenant and failed to lattain that for which they had been icalled. You can readily see that this covenant was for service, not in any way connected with obtaining salvation.

But after it was broken, the terms of the covenant became law. The law wos added beacuse of transgressions. When the terms of the covenant became law, the death penalty was added to 9 out of the 10 commands. Now it was law, and it was to be obeyed so that a man might live. This still had no connection with everlasting life. It was so that men might live together iwith a reasonable degree of peace and that they might not forget God their Greatox.

Just as the forbidden fruit in the garden was a test of obedience, iso was the covenant a teat of obedience for Israel. Just as the sentence of death was not immediately jcarried out for Adem and Eve, just iso, at the intervention of Moses, the death sentence on Israel was not carried out at the time. But the law condems to death.

Since the law brings condemnation, our Lord fulfilled it and took the penalty upon Kimself at Calvary, dying instead of those who broke it. The law was designed to teach Israel their weakness in ithe flesh and so lead them to the coming Christ Who would be everything to them which they lacked.

Some have the notion yet today that everlasting life and justification cen be gotten thru keeping the commandments. In the first place the lave v:as not for Gentiles. In the second place is vas made iplain to all the.t by the deeds of the law shall no flesh be justified. The duty of every Christian yet today is to love God and his fellow men. That principle has never bean abolished.

It is generally known that for a long time people had so carelessiy read their Bibles that they believed that Elijah went up in a Chariot of fire, that Absailom dangled by his hair from a tree, that there were 3 executed on Calvary instead of 5, that Peter denied 3 times instead of 6 , that the Lord was tempted 3 times in the wilderness instead of 6 , that the Gadarenes and the Gergesenes were one and the same, that the Lord had I triumphal entry instead of 2, and many other like instances.

But it still is not so generally known thet there is more than one BODY of believers in the $N T$. In fact there are several, but the name BODY is directly applied to only two of the groups. It is not applied to the largest group, those who have only everlasting life. Neither is it applied to the group of overcomers called THE MAN CHITD in Rev. 12.

During Acts and the time of the preaching of the kingdom gospel there was a BnDY of believers IN CHRIST. Yet as we read 1 Cor. 12 very carefully, we notice that the members spoken of seem more to be gifts then individual believers. It was a BODY endowed with spiritual gifts. The members were not on an equality. Some members were parts of the head. To sum it up, it was a BCDY Iikened to a human body with its geveral merabers. Its hope was the coming King to the earth.

But in the prison epistles written after Acts we find a different BCIDY. Its meribers are believers. They are all equal. No individual parts or members are named. Christ is the HEAD. It is spoken of as IIS BODY. The hope of this group is to be manifested with Him in heavenly places, (Col. 3:4). This BODY wija be there waiting when He is manifested, (Enil. 3:20).
