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All our righteousnesses are as filthy rags. There is none righteous, no, not one, God is righteous, and God alone; but we do not call men righteous.

Some men may think that they can get by with God just because they may be as good as some church members they have then? Of course we only know of one of seen. But God requires a holiness and righteousness of men. Where is man going to get them? How is he going to measure up to God's requirements?

Abraham was a friend of God. But where did he get the requirements to be on such terms with God? Abraham believed God, and it was counted unto him for righteousness. This is imputed righteousness. It is imputed because of faith. Any man can have this. Any man that believeth on Him that justifieth the ungodly, his faith is counted for righteousness. It is not how good he may be or how morally upright he may be in the sight of his neighbors, but it all depends on his faith. Ah! Who knows the blessedness of the man unto whom God im puteth righteousness without works!

What do we mean by imputed righteousness? Do you have a dollar bill? Just a piece of Paper, isn't it? But with (not to become children of the kingdom), a little printing on it in green ink in just the right way, and it is imputed with the worth of a silver dollar. But the paper is almost worthless.

So by faith we put on the righteousness of Christ. When God looks at us He sees the foundations of the New Jerusalem, there the righteousness of His Beloved Son. -WHAT SHALL THIS MAN DO?-A great many are wondering about this same question yet today. All during the Acts period, we know that the 12 were busy making the re-offer of the King and the Kingdom. But if any were stillalive at the end of Acts, what were they to do them who lived beyond this period, and that was John, the beloved disciple.

John's gospel was written after the ministry of Paul was completed, if we can trust history. The internal evidence will place it after Acts 28:28, for it begins with the national rejection of Israel at that time. Since Paul closed the doors of the Kingdom at the end of Acts, then what gospel could John preach?

The gospel that he has written answers the question. In it we find no Kingdom message. In it we find nothing about repentance, only a historical account of water baptism, and nothing about the Lord's Supper; all of which are connected with the gospel of the Kingdom. In it we find the Lord proclaimed the SAVIOR of the world. We find that after the national rejection. John tells us that as many as received Him were given the power, but the children of God. John proclaims that whosoever, even those of any color or nationality, may believe and have everlasting life.

Since John's name is to be written in he could not very well have a part in and proclaim the gospel of the Dispensation of the Mystery. But God did have a ministry for John, and now we know what this was to do. The gospel of everlasting life is foundation work. On it is built the higher calling. Only a few ever know and receive the truth of the higher calling. Most of the Christians today that are earnest and devoted to the Lord have only everlasting life. Like that of Job and the dying malefactor, their destiny is an earthly one. They will have a part in the new earth. Their resurrection will be a later one.

-THE HOPE OF HEAVEN-

One, who believes that his church began at Pentecost, says, "The church is divided into 3 parts: the church triumphant (the church in heaven), the church suffering (Purgatory), and the church militant (here on earth)."

But if his church did begin at Pentecost and Peter was the father of the church, there is a great contradiction with Scriptural facts. Neither Peter nor the rest of the 12 ever knew of heaven being a hope for any of God's people.

That a family of God should have a hope of heaven was never revealed till the 12 had completed their ministry of the Kingdom, (the Acts of the apostles). Even John, whose ministry lasted later than that of Paul, had no message of a hope of heaven. Those who only have everlasting life and do not belong to the Church which is the Body of Christ, they their hearts. have the earth for their hope. Man was made of the earth and was to have dominion over the earth. Job expected to see his Redeemer at the latter day on the earth (Job 19:25, 26). As we search all the prophecies of the O T we find that the only hope that Israel had was to be resurrected and enjoy the kingdom here on the earth. During Acts it was declared that David had not ascended up to heaven (Acts 2:34). David fully expected to see his Lord rule over Israel here on earth.

Another mistake usually made is that heaven and hell are opposites. Now all the Scriptures speak of only 2 spheres ated the heaven and the earth. But you can start at Genesis and read thru your Bible and the first mention of a man having a hope of heaven is found in Eph.

The Kingdom will be here on earth. Abraham and Isaac and Jacob will be in it and will sit down with those who believed and were added at Pentecost. It is further revealed that the most faithhere on the earth after the Kingdom is over. But the Pentecostal or Acts church will never see heaven.

There are several statements in the Word that should make us pause and do a little pondering. It may be that we at times over rate our persuasive powers and cease to give God the praise when praise is due. Many also have the idea that a man can, at any time he chooses, accept God's salvation.

It then becomes apparent that God is in which there will be life hereafter, heavenlightening those who will respond. He ven and earth. In the beginning God cre-has chosen those who will hear. Thus we can understand what He meant when He said that His sheep hear His voice and follow Him. There is not an instance in the Lord's earthly ministry where He called a person and that person did not respond.

"O my son Absalom, my son, my son Absalom! Would God I had died for thee. O Absalom, my son, my son!" Thus the heartbroken king David wept for his worthless, no-account son. This son had been unruly and selfish from his youth up. He engineered the murder of his brother. He led an insurrection against his father, the king. It mattered not that he endangered the life of his father, and then to add insult to injury, he shamed his father before all Israel.

But in spite of all these faults, David loved Absalom. When the battle was in progress and the news came in, David was not so much interested in the outcome of the battle, but would ask. "Is the young man Absalom safe?" You may well ask how that he could so love such an ungrateful and rebellious son, even to the extent that he willingly would have died for him.
