"For by grace are ye saved through faith; and that not of yourselves: it is the gift of God." 2:8.

It is the custom to parallel this passage with John 3:16. But they are not about the same thing. John is speaking of everlasting life. Paul is speaking of salvation. But even salvation is not always the same thing in all the Scriptures. In the gospel of the kingdom, salvation raised one to kingdom rights and privileges. But here in Eph. salvation raises one to rights and privileges of membership in the body of Christ. Furthermore, this salvation is not so much FROM as it is TO. But we will leave that for you to work out.

In the first of this verse are three words that stand out. They are GRACE, SAVED, and FAITH. Then follows the word THAT. Since a pronoun must have an antecedent, which of these three words is the antecedent? When the grammatical structure is examined, we find that it does not refer back from Ur of the Chaldees. The expectation of to any one of the three. THAT is neuter in gender. So the only way to paraphrase it is thus; "For by grace are ye saved through faith; and that grace-by-faith-salvation is not of yourselves: it is the gift of God."

Faith is the means by which we obtain this salvation. But faith is not a work, it is the acceptance of a fact or a truth or the trusting in a promise. It is believing what God has said and acting on it.

But why should God make this kind of a provision? There is no other way in which He could make it available to all, rich and poor, high and low, educated and ignorant, wise and fools, etc., etc. There is no respect of persons in this arrangement. It is perfectly fair to all. But far above all that, it gives to God the glory.

In the Word you will find that giving and loving are closely related. God so loved... that He gave. Here we have the same thing. It is the gift of God. Nowhere else do we find this expression in connection with salvation. What a wonderful gift it is!

For by grace are ye saved. Grace is all of God. There is no reason here for us to be boasting. The salvation is by the finished work of Christ on Calvary. But more than that; we are saved to glory. Who can find any fault with that?

Have you ever noticed how that grace and faith are linked together so often? It is so in this verse. On the other hand law and works are linked together. So if this were by works, then law, not grace, would have to enter in. But we are not under law. -THE PARENTHESIS-

When we speak of a parenthesis, we are speaking of something that is inserted for comment or explanation. It has been the custom of some time to speak of the dispensation of the mystery as being a parenthesis. But strictly speaking, it does not fulfil the meaning of that term. The epistles which reveal the dispensation of the mystery are complete in themselves. They do not necessarily comment on or explain what goes before or comes after. They are complete in the sense that they are all that is needed for the setting up and functioning of that group which is called the fellowship or dispensation of the mystery.

But there is a portion of Scripture that may well be called a parenthesis. It is the Acts of the Apostles and the 14 epistles related to and written during that time. We know that the Acts was a part of the kingdom program and teaching. This had its start with the choosing of a nation in Abram that nation was a kingdom, with the King coming from the house of Judah. It was a kingdom that should have no end.

In the fulness of time the King was born in Bethlehem of Judaea. The Kingdom was first proclaimed or preached by John the Baptist. Then the King Himself, along with the 12 and the 70, proclaimed the kingdom. The multitude would have made Him King, but would not accept Him as Priest, for that would be against their religion and traditions. So they crucified Him.

So the setting up of a kingdom with a King-Priest at the head was postponed (we use this word in absence of a better expression. It was postponed to such a time as when Israel would repent as a nation and receive the One, the Just One, Whom they murdered.

So during Acts the apostles simply were marking time. They were waiting to see if Israel would repent. They had a commission to fulfil, but it could not be fulfilled till all Israel as a nation repented (changed their mind and submitted to Him as Potentate). The reason they could not fulfil the great commission was that they were not under the jurisdiction of the new covenant. They had a foretaste of it, but it was never in force. See Jer. 31:31.

So it happens that Acts is a continuation of what "Jesus both began to do and teach." It was no more than that. Israel did not obtain what she sought for. But the remnant did. What is going on today is not a parenthesis, but a separate purpose.

-WHO IS MADE UNTO US-

We read too rapidly and do not stop to think. We should meditate more on the Word. We miss so much in our hurry. A sample of what is meant follows;

There are 4 things which God has made Christ to be unto His people. They are Wisdom, and righteousness, and sanctification, and redemption. 1 Cor. 1:30.

I. Wisdom. The greatest wisdom of which man can boast is only foolishness in the sight of God. But the wisdom from above is foolishness to the man of the world, one who is still in the flesh. He cannot understand the things of God. God can and does take the foolish things of the world to confound the wise (those who think they are wise).

The natural man cannot receive the wisdom that comes from above, those things that are taught by the Holy Spirit. They are spiritually discerned. One must have the mind of Christ to learn of God.

II. Righteousness. The best righteousness that man can produce, even under the law is as filthy rags in the sight of God. There is nothing right about the flesh. It is corrupt. So many think that after one is saved, then what he does (thinking that it is right) is right. But that which is right is not what we do with the old nature, the old man or the flesh, but what is done in us by the Holy Spirit thru the new nature or the new man. No man, saved or unsaved, can boast of his good works. We are His workmanship. We are to walk in the good works that were before ordained that we should walk in them. As to standing, we must be clothed with the righteousness of Christ, accepted in the Beloved. This standing can never be changed.

III. Sanctification. This is by no means a process of getting "gooder and gooder."

Just as we must get wisdom from above, just as we must get righteousness from above, just so must we get our sanctification. It is not any work of the flesh. It is a work in us by virtue of what Christ was made unto us. Again there is no place for boasting. Those who make it a work of the flesh often flippently remark that they lose their sanctification. They would never make such a statement if they realized the truth!

IV. Redemption. No repentance or doing penance in the flesh can avail in this matter. No man can by any means redeem his brother (or himself). Christ was made unto us redemption. He paid the price with His precious blood shed on Calvary. It was not silver or gold that paid it. Neither was it any good works. We have nothing to offer. He paid it all. Praise His name!

-CHRIST OUR HOPE-

"Paul an apostle of Jesus Christ by the commandment of God our Savior, and Lord Jesus Christ, which is our hope." I Tim.

Whenever we have hope in the objective in the Word of God, it always refers to the Lord Jesus Christ being manifested in His glory to His people, whether on earth or in the super-heavens. In all references to our hope, we must not lose sight of Christ. It is not a mere doctrine that holds our attention, but a Person. As a contrast to the above statements, when Christ appears to those on the earth who are not His people, He certainly will not be their hope. Rather, to them it will be the great and terrible day of the Lord.

The various names and titles of Christ are keys to His manifestations to His families of believers. The church of the dispensation of the mystery, for example, is not looking for a Man of war, a King to deliver them from the nations of the earth.

Several years ago a lecturer said to his audience, "Tell me what you know of Christ, and I will tell you where you are as to your Christian experience." That statement is one that ought to make us stop and think.

To those who perish, any phase of preaching about the cross is foolishness. But to us who believe, it is the good news that thereon was one who shields us from what we deserved as sinners -- wrath. How we should thank God that His Son has made us meet for the inheritance of the most holy place. We are accepted in the Beloved.

The Lord Jesus Christ is our holiness before God. But to live holy before men, Christ must dwell in us. Wen we look to the cross, we see what God has done for us. It is, "I am crucified with Christ." The seccret of holiness is identification or oneness with Christ in His death. We must be able to say, "I have died with Christ."

But how does that make for holiness? Well, did you ever see a dead man lose his temper? How about it? Did you ever think of that when the old man began to rise up within you? Does a dead man have eyes for the things of the world? Does he? Not only dead with Christ, but quickened with Him! Our eyes should be turned, not to the world or anything it may offer, but turned upward to where Christ sits at the right hand of God. This is practical Christianity!

Just a word of warning here. Death is not the hope of the believer. Death came as a result of sin. If there had been no sin, then there would have been no death.

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When we study the synoptic gospels, we find that consistently John the Baptist, the 12, the 70 and the Lord Himself had one theme for their preaching or proclaiming. It was "Repent for the kingdom of heaven is at hand."

When the Lord was on the tree among thieves and malefactors, among Pharisees and Roman soldiers, He expressed a prayer that we must not forget. He said, "Father, forgive them for they know not what they do." There is no question as to whom is meant by THEM. Peter told the Jews That they had crucified their Messiah (Acts 2:36). Stephen said the same thing of them in Acts 7:52. That prayer was answered, hence the ministry of the 12 and others in Acts. If that prayer had not been answered, then Acts could never have been written.

In Acts 1:6 we have the apostles asking about the hope of Israel. They said, Wilt Thou at this time restore again the kingdom to Israel? Do not mistake me. The hope of Israel was the King, but never the King without a kingdom.

As we march thru Acts we find from time to time an echo of this theme. There is a prophetic miracle by Peter and then another by Paul. Both look forward to coming events. Peter's miracle looked for the restoration of Israel, their healing that the prophets spoke about. Paul's miracle looked forward to their being blinded as foretold and warned in Isa. 6.

When we get to the very last chapter of the Acts we find that the hope of Israel is still the theme. Paul says, "For the hope of Israel I am bound with this chain." All thru Acts to this point the witness of all the apostles, Paul included, was to the soon coming of the King to set up His kingdom. The epistles written during Acts point to the same thing. The coming of the Lord was nigh. They were to look for Him and be ready.

Even the Paul preached a gospel of grace to Gentiles during Acts, yet his reason for preaching even that was that some of his own people, the Jews, might be saved. See Rom. 11:14.

But beginning at Jerusalem and spreading thruout the colonies, even to Rome, the Jews consistently rejected the coming King and His kingdom. So there was only one thing that God could do. He sent the blindness that had been forewarned, and salvation (Christ) was sent to the Gentiles (Acts 28:28).

For a real understanding of Acts and the epistles written then, we must know all this.

DEAR YOUNG FOLKS: Just recently I read a story about a little boy who had been born blind. Finally a few years later a very delicate operation gave him his sight. When the day came that the bandages could be removed and he looked upon the world for the first time he was enraptured. Then he asked his mother why she had not told him that it was so beautiful. She broke into tears and said that she had done her best to tell it, but that he was not able to comprehend it. There was no way in which she could have made him understand. He had never seen.

All children are born blind spiritually. They cannot see or know the beauties of Christ, His holiness. The connot comprehend the mercy, grace, and love of God. The natural man (the old nature) cannot comprehend the things of God. That is what our Lord told Nicodemus. It was necessary for Nicodemus to be born from above, by water (the Word) and the Spirit if he were to enter into or understand the things of God.

And like the little boy, when one does get this understanding, he wonders why he had never been told about it before. He also goes out and tries to tell others, only to find that they too are blind and cannot perceive. It takes a little while for him to get to realize that they are as he once was.

Now, is Bible reading and study a bore to you? Do you dread the sessions of Bible study when you go to class with your parents? Do you wonder why folks are all the time talking Bible instead of the latest movies, television, or maybe ball? It might be that you are blind and do not know it! It would be a good idea to think it over and investigate. You may be missing the very best things of life. Without spiritual perception, you have absolutely no knowledge of the relative value of things. Offer a little child a penny and a worn dollar bill, and the chances are that he will take the bright penny. He has as yet no knowledge of the relative value. People of the world are just that childish. They even laugh at those who choose the things that abide, thinking that they are foolish.

It is also true that there are many who have eyes, but do not see. It is like many who have ears, but do not hear. It is a need of training. The musician hears thing that others cannot. The artist sees things that others cannot. And so it is in spiritual truth. It is by the teaching of the Holy Spirit that we get to know the things of God. Joy in the realm of spiritual things is far better than all the happiness in the world. Try it,
